Dear Friends.

What a difference one year can make. The Allentown School District Foundation Board of Directors and the three part-time folks who work for the foundation got down to business this year. There has been positive movement on all fronts. Our purpose remains vital, with the opportunity to address larger programs with more impact as we move forward. Highlights:

- We are proud partners with the Allentown School District (ASD), working in alignment with the District to identify programs and opportunities that will result in real progress for our students and for our schools.
- New Executive Director, Susan L. Williams, continues to create momentum by solving problems to make our business easier to manage. Communication is timelier, the website is up-to-date, project management guidelines (including standard program evaluations) are being instituted all leaving more time to do the important stuff such as program development and fundraising.
- Our Board of Directors remains the backbone of this non-profit effort and it includes a corps of committed long-termers and newbies that bring important skill sets for the future.
- We hold ourselves accountable to our donors and supporters. An impact report now tracks student participation in our programs. Let it be said that we touched the lives of 2,658 students in meaningful ways this year.
- Our new accounting system has improved in its ability to be more user friendly and our reports for official audit and Form 990 are ahead of schedule.
- The number of senior scholarships has expanded, with teacher Mary Leiby and Judge Madaline Palladino endowments adding meaningful contributions to the scholarship fund that we hope sets the stage for renewed philanthropy from more teachers and successful alumni from all of our schools.

The Foundation is starting its seventh year of operation. Everywhere we look we see opportunities to make a difference. Specifically, the ASDF is in a discovery mode to determine how we can help with the literacy challenges of the District from a volunteer perspective. Stay tuned.

There is a remarkable group of parents, volunteers, teachers, administrators, and last but not least, board members, who provide the support – time, talent and treasures – to be commended for never, ever giving up. The same is true of the individuals and organizations listed on page 16, our donors.

Many of Allentown School District's elementary students participated in several enriched programs that added more educational opportunities for success in 2015-2016. During the past year, the ASDF Renaissance Program provided funding for 12 practicing artists, teachers and musicians in 15 elementary and kindergarten schools to augment current curricula. More than 835 elementary students benefitted in 2015-2016 from these programs, made possible with EITC funds and other key sponsors of the Foundation:



- Artist Rosemary Geseck met with 100 5th grade students at Ritter Elementary School weekly for 10 weeks and developed a theme around Pennsylvania colonial history in collaboration with Principal Melissa Marcks and teachers. Actor-educator George Miller portrayed colonial-era milliner, Peter Grim, providing a colorful snapshot of life in the Lehigh Valley in the 19th century. 5th grade students learned portraiture, using oil pastels and watercolor to create expressive and colorful portraits from a live model. Their work was exhibited at Mayfair and the Heritage Museum. Students also took a field trip to see Peter Grim's historical mill site near Whitehall.
- Artist Rosemary Geseck worked in collaboration with the Wildlands Conservancy to provide a handson look at Pennsylvania animals for 100 Ritter 4th grade students. Following the Wildlands
 presentation, students met for eight sessions to sketch and render Pennsylvania
 birds from authentic models, using oil pastels and watercolor. This collaborative
 science and art residency was a memorable experience for students.



• Artist Matt Halm worked with 5th grade students from Washington Elementary School to design and paint a permanent mural inside their cafeteria. Matt worked with students to develop the mural content, soliciting ideas from each student involved, who presented their ideas on napkin-sized sketches. Matt composed the

sketches into a meaningful and coherent mural. The end product features neighborhood elements and President George Washington.

- Artist Matt Halm also worked with 3rd, 4th and 5th grade students at Lehigh Parkway to design and paint a panelized exterior mural. The mural is located on an exterior brick wall opposite the school's main entrance. Students contributed ideas on napkin-sized sketch sheets that were included as iconic elements from the adjacent Lehigh Parkway and other recognizable Allentown landmarks.
- The Lines and Spaces Summer Instrumental Music Camp was developed and led by Joe Busolits, Will Wagner and Larry Flynn, ASD elementary instrumental music teachers. The camp, in its third year, was open to instrumental students from 14 elementary schools and culminated with a performance at West Park in August.
- Based on ASD teacher Janice Altieri's book, *An Allentown Adventure*, 5th grade students from Mosser, Central, Union Terrace and Lehigh Parkway Elementary Schools learned about Allentown history and treasured landmarks by visiting the sites with sketch books in hand, artfully memorializing their impressions. Kate Scuffle, George Miller and Rosemary Geseck were teaching artists for Allentown Adventure, taking 338 students to more than 24 local landmarks in all.

ASDF supported programs emphasize opportunities for middle schoolers in Allentown to explore new experiences. Here are some highlights:

- Middle school students learned the salsa, merengue, bachata and cumbia as part of the Latin Dance Program and Competition, which is held annually in November. While practicing discipline, commitment and team work, students met for a head-to-head dance competition between the middle schools on November 20, 2015 at William Allen High School. Trexler Middle School won the trophy in front of a full house.
- The annual Science Fair, supported by the DaVinci Science Center and volunteer mentors, enabled 380 middle school students from Trexler, Raub, Harrison-Morton and South Mountain to develop meaningful science projects and participate in local and regional science fair competitions. Congratulations to the approximately 655 total participants of this year's Science Fair who conducted controlled experiments to answer or solve a specific problem or question; recorded and analyzed their data; created a display board explaining their project; and presented their findings to the judges. Nineteen students qualified for the state PA Junior Academy of Science competition held at State College and 15 participated serving as support technicians. More than 50 professionals from the community comprised the judging panel.
- Thanks to ASDF, the National History Day Program (NHD) has been in all ASD middle schools for several years. More than 110 students prepared NHD projects and competed for the honor of representing their school at regional and state competitions. National History Day is an opportunity for students to experience project-based learning, spending 3-4 months developing projects. Students present their projects as a documentary, a website, a performance, a paper or an exhibit. Fifteen of 19 students who qualified went to the regional competition at Jim Thorpe High School on March 12, 2016. The district was represented by seven groups of 8th grade students and four groups of 9th grade students. Jasmine Broderick, a 9th grader from William Allen, and Carrie Spangler, an 8th grader from Trexler Middle School, both won third place awards in their respective categories and went on to the state level competition at Millersville University on May 11 and 12.
- Allentown DRIVE returned baseball to each middle school in spring 2016 for the fourth consecutive
 year, teaching players the basics of the game while reinforcing the values of integrity, dedication and
 hard work. The season culminated in a city championship tournament at Coca-Cola Park. South
 Mountain Middle School defeated Raub Middle School and took home the Allentown DRIVE Middle
 School Baseball championship trophy.
- ASDF also allocates EITC funds through its Renaissance Program to support theatre arts programs in each middle school, directly benefitting more than 120 students, with 2,000 more youngsters in middle and elementary school auditoriums attending the productions. Each middle school receives \$2,000.
- Twenty-five middle school students and teachers, and 30 high school students and teachers traveled to New York City to see a Broadway show, *The Lion King*, as a special thank you for their dedicated effort to make the High Notes performance a success in 2016. Individuals and companies supported pairs of students with \$300 Broadway sponsorships. We hope to grow the number of these scholarships going forward.





High school programs supported by the Allentown School District Foundation showcase group and individual accomplishments in academics, arts and athletics. Highlights:

- The ASD Academic Showcase of Excellence (Grades 1 –12), brainchild of ASD Gifted Support Teachers Sally Wolfe and Joann Manjarrez, took place in May 2016 at Miller Symphony Hall, featuring outstanding students and their prize projects. Parents, guardians, educators, ASD and ASDF board members plus community leaders viewed first-hand the high level of student acumen.
- The William Allen High School Chorale performed at Muhlenberg College's A Cappella Festival with proceeds going to ASDF. William Allen Instrumental Teacher Eric Moser is working to increase the number of musicians for band and orchestra programs. EITC donors provide much needed funding for instruments and equipment. In addition, the Foundation allocates \$3,000 to each high school theatre program as an acknowledgement of their dedication and effort at the HIGH NOTES gala.
- Student displays of art and/or musical performances are presented at Art-in-the-Park, Mayfair, Community Days, PPL Plaza and other venues for community enjoyment.
- Partner Color Run hosted a 5k run in October at Allentown's Cedar Creek Parkway. ASDF recruits student volunteers who work to support their high school organizations. Runners were covered in colorful powdered paint as they ran. The Run contributed \$8,000 to clubs. Another event, Music on the Run, happened soon thereafter in Lehigh Parkway with net proceeds going to the WAHS Chorale.
- Twenty-five middle school students and teachers, and 30 high school students and teachers traveled to New York City to see a Broadway show, *The Lion King*, as a special thank you for their dedicated effort to make the High Notes performance a success in 2016. Individuals and companies support pairs of students with \$300 Broadway sponsorships.

Senior Scholarships

A total of \$28,007.40 was awarded in 2016.



Party also unified alumni in a spirited celebration of Husky Pride. In August 2015,

the Alumni Association treated the Dieruff Football Team and Coaches to an afternoon of fun in the sun at the annual Picnic and Swim Party at the home of John and Jinny Hughes.

Our traditional tailgate party preceding the Dieruff vs. William Allen Football Game brought alumni together with the Dieruff Cheerleaders, AFROTC Cadets, and the band. An added element of excitement was provided by Pro Football Hall of Famer and Dieruff Alum Andre Reed, who attended the party, and then was honored at halftime by having the playing field at J.Birney Crum Stadium named after him.



During the Christmas Holidays, our Alumni Choir visited several senior centers in Allentown, sharing their joyful voices and joyous spirit throughout the hallways. They touched the hearts of



many, and this promises to become an annual tradition. The Dieruff "Sew What?" Club, the after-school sewing club sponsored by the Alumni Association, delivered a remarkable dose of Husky Pride to the Community. Partnering with the Lehigh Valley Health Network, the club converted discarded operating room surgical wrap material into ponchos, back packs, bed rolls, and tarps for the homeless in Allentown. The project received impressive media coverage, and was cited by the Mayor and the City of Allentown during an event named "Catch a Young Person Doing Something Right."

Following a year of research and publicity, the Alumni Association was able to identify two Dieruff students who

left school before graduation to join the military. These two young men, Dennis Burian and Richard Seng, were identified as qualifying for high school diplomas under a program entitled "Operation Recognition." Sadly, both had joined the Marines and were killed in action in Vietnam. Family

members proudly received posthumous diplomas at the June 2016 Commencement ceremonies.

Complementing our alumni website and Facebook page, we have added a monthly alumni newsletter that is emailed to over 6,000 alumni. With articles that cover all things "Blue and Gray," we are keeping alumni abreast of happenings at Dieruff High School, as well as with our busy Alumni Association schedule of events. During the fiscal year, \$365,000 of contributions were made to the ASD Foundation for Building 21, a new high school within the school district. These contributions were passed through to an unrelated non-profit organization, New Venture Fund, which was soliciting donations for the project. Since these contributions to the Foundation are not administered by the Foundation, neither the monies received or expended are included in the above Statement of Revenue and Expenses. At June 30, 2016, the Foundation was not holding any monies for Building 21 that needed to be disbursed to New Venture Fund.

Teacher Innovation Grants

As a signature program geared for greater growth each year, ASDF's Teacher Innovation Grants (TIG) program provides funding for teachers, school counselors and nurses to develop original inclass projects that inspire students to go beyond routine day-to-day learning. In 2015-2016, the Foundation granted \$15,230.82 to 18 dedicated and creative educators.

The stage of the hall is important for two reasons: while it is used to accommodate the overflow of dinner guests, it provides a professional backdrop for performances by Allentown's two public high schools and four middle schools after dinner.
